THE PURPOSE OF THE SUBJECT, LEARNING OUTCOMES:

The course includes practical knowledge of practicing diplomats related to the topics of the courses.

The course includes a block during which classes the students will model individually and in a group diplomatic situations and decision making.

The students will understand the basic features of diplomacy, they will understand the theoretic approaches (theory and international law) and the practical highlights (diplomatic protocol). The students will be able to navigate when reading different sources between foreign policy and diplomacy and they will understand what makes diplomacy different from international relations.

SUMMARY OF THE CONTENT OF THE SUBJECT

The dynamics of the class is also based on the individual interests of the students which is assessed at the first class.

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The course includes a block during which classes the students will model individually and in a group diplomatic situations and decision making.

STUDENT'S TASKS AND PLANNED LEARNING ACTIVITIES:

The students need to be present at the classes and even more importantly at the block exercise.

The students need to present on a chosen journal article, a chosen topic and submit a policy analysis. All the details are subject of change due to their individual nature which are tailored to the students individual needs and interests.

EVALUATION OF THE SUBJECT:

The evaluation of the course is complex and the students need to prove that they are able to present their thoughts individually and in groups.

The special requirements are designed individually and they are discussed at the beginning of the course.
